THE GIFT OF THE WORD

SCRIPTURE Mark 6:1-13

They said, "Where did this man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been given to him? What deeds of power are being done by his hands! Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary and brother of James and Joses and Judas and Simon, and are not his sisters here with us?" And they took offense at him. Then Jesus said to them, "Prophets are not without honor, except in their hometown, and among their own kin, and in their own house." And he could do no deed of power there, except that he laid his hands on a few sick people and cured them. And he was amazed at their unbelief.

Outdoor In-person Worship planned for July: As Plymouth continues the journey of determining how and when it is safe to re-open the physical church, plans are in place for in-person worship outdoors at the "Point" at Plymouth during July. Worship will continue to be streamed live on Facebook and available by phone via Zoom:

In the event of rain, please check your email Sunday morning at 8am or listen to the church voicemail's message for the plan for that particular Sunday

In order to help us plan and to worship safely together, please:

- 1) Register by calling the church office or signing up <u>HERE</u>;
- 2) Chairs will be provided, but feel free to bring your own if you wish. Please sit socially distanced from those not in your household;
- 3) Wear a mask when moving about (there are some adults in our community and all children under 12 who have not been vaccinated)

Greeters and Ushers Needed for Outdoor Worship: A sure signal that things are returning to normal is the need for greeters and ushers. Greeters say hello as people arrive and help direct them to the worship space. Ushers can distribute the bulletin and help collect the offering once we are back in the sanctuary.

GATHERING IN-PERSON SURVEY: Your input is important as Plymouth makes decisions regarding gathering in-person for worship and other activities. A survey has been distributed via email and mailed to those without technology. Please take a moment to complete it as soon as possible. If you did NOT receive the survey, contact the church office. Deadline for responding is Sunday, July 4.
